

The public is invited to attend the Grand Opening and Dedication of the Great Lakes Campus on Wednesday, April 21. The Ribbon-Cutting Ceremony will be at 2:30 p.m. with Public Tours following from 3:00-7:00 p.m. In honor of the occasion, the improvisory acoustic group, "Neptune Quartet" has produced an original CD called "The Great Thaw" and will give a free premiere performance of the music at 7:00 p.m. after the Grand Opening. NMC alum Glen Wolff is a member of the group and has created a print which will be available for sale along with the CD.

"This is an important occasion for the college and the community," NMC President Tim Nelson said. "The voters of Grand Traverse County supported this project by approving the bond request in 1999 and now NMC has kept its promise to tear down the freezer building and create a beautiful new facility on this special site."

Special indeed. Located on eight acres and five-hundred feet of frontage on West Bay in Traverse City, the Great Lakes Campus opens up "a whole new view" and a new front door for NMC.

Four program areas inhabit the two wings which are connected by a see-through glass exhibit hall.

- The Great Lakes Water Studies Institute;
- The Great Lakes Maritime Academy;
- The Great Lakes Culinary Institute;
- The Hagerty Center.

The Great Lakes Campus Campaign has raised over \$3 million to complete the project. In February, Rotary Charities of Traverse City pledged \$1 million to support the Water Studies Institute and launch an "Alliance for Great Lakes Stewardship" which will involve Rotarians in projects to protect freshwater.

WNMC Adds Listeners & Hours

The latest Arbitron ratings show that WNMC listeners have increased from 3,000 per week in fall,1999 to 8,600 in fall, 2003. General Manager Eric Hines said, "We've worked hard to focus on listeners and make the scheduling more consistent."

That scheduling includes a jazz-based mix during the daytime and a variety of roots music, specialty and alternative rock shows at night. "It's live, not canned," Hines said. "We have an open format and dedicated programmers who share their knowledge and enthusiasm."

As a result, WNMC at 90.7 FM not only has more listeners but they're staying tuned for more hours—up from 1.75 per day to 4. "With these new ratings, we are competitive with other public radio stations," Hines said, "which enhances our underwriting support."

Looking ahead, Hines is exploring the addition of a morning show. "Drive time is really important," he said, "and we have access to some great resources close at hand." These resources include college faculty, concert series, cultural activities and lectures, "It will be a mix of information and music," Hines said. "There are lots of possibilities."

Power Systems Program Starts Fall '04

"We're looking for college prep students with mechanical aptitude," Great Lakes Maritime Academy Instructor Mike Hochscheidt said. "They need to have good problem-solving skills and be self-disciplined." Hochscheidt is describing candidates for the "Power Systems Program" which will train graduates to operate power plants, starting fall 2004.

Several maritime academies offer these kinds of programs in "facilities management" because their engineering programs provide much of the basic curriculum. "Some of our Maritime graduates have switched from ship to shore," Hochscheidt said, "and found very good jobs at various utilities, hospitals and universities."

One of those graduates is Parish Geers who works for CMS Energy near Grayling. "I like working with a lot of different kinds of equipment, such as hydraulics, pneumatics, control systems, motors, generators, and pumps because you're always learning," he said. "I believe opportunities in this field are very good, due to the trend toward more medium-sized generating plants and increased demand for electricity."

Hochscheidt developed the coursework for the new program and is enthusiastic about its possibilities. "These skills prepare you for many different kinds of jobs," he said, "and it's challenging work with job security."

"Getting into trouble was the worst and the best thing that ever happened to me," Sally Beemon said. Growing up

in Charlevoix, Beemon was doing well in high school until she "started hanging around with the wrong kids and hating my parents." A turning point came when she was arrested for "minor in possession of alcohol."

"The judge gave me a choice of going to a detention home or a work camp in Colorado with my church," she said. "I went to the camp and reclaimed my spirituality." Her youth group leader gave her a "Life Transformation Award" and she returned to school, worked hard, and graduated with her class.

After a semester at another college, Beemon came to NMC. "I love this college," she said, "The small classes

and the teachers who get to know you." While working two jobs, she's managed to earn a 3.81 grade point average and get involved with Phi Theta Kappa, the honor society for community colleges.

Nominated by NMC to the All-USA Academic Team, Beemon received the top spot in the State of Michigan and a scholarship from Coca Cola as a "New
